FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK

From the Pastor's Desk

Our Identity, Our Purpose, Our Response

"This, then, is how you should regard us: as servants of Christ and as stewards of the mysteries of God." 1 Corinthians 4:1

More and more we are hearing reference to this word 'stewardship', in the areas of business and commerce, education, the not for profit sector, the environmental movement and even sport. Stewardship is not a church word, although it has long been associated with the life, work, theology and practices of the Christian Church. Unfortunately, more and more churches are shying away from the use of the word because of the perception that people are turned off by it; namely, because it is seen as a slick euphemism for asking congregants to give more money.

Over the years I have preached, lead workshops, taught, and written about stewardship. I believe it is crucial to understanding and enacting our identity and purpose as a church, and as individual followers of Jesus seeking to live out our faith and life faithfully. In broad terms, stewardship refers to 'the manner in which we acknowledge and handle all that has been entrusted to us.' This definition signals that we are recipients of gifts from a Giver.

That Giver is God. God gives gifts of love, talents, life, faith, the earth, strength, resources, hope, imagination, community, humour, creativity, music...and on and on. Once we recognize and acknowledge that these are not earned achievements, we are set free to partner with God and use these

gifts for the priorities of God.

However, this is where the need for teaching and reflecting on stewardship is so necessary. We know that parts of our human nature as well as the some of the messaging in our society lead us to believe that what we are and what we have, we've earned and achieved on our own. Further, that we can do whatever we want with what we have. As people of faith, we beg to differ with this reasoning. "In the beginning, God..." We believe that it all begins with God. As well, the life, teaching, death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ lays out explicitly to whom we belong, what we are for, and how we can be transformed and sustained to partner with God to accomplish God's priorities, that is, God's "will on earth". Through regular worship, prayer, service, study and faith formation, fun and fellowship, spiritual practices, conversations and debate, we get to discover, develop and deploy our gifts and faith and generosity and service.

An interesting convergence is taking place. Here at Parkdale United, as part of our discernment and opening to God's Spirit at our last two Annual General Meetings, we included in these meetings a period of prayer, discussion and feedback using the following questions.

AGM 2014

- 1. What are you passionate about in the life and ministry of Parkdale United?
- 2. In what ways are we supporting one another within the congregation and encouraging our growth in prayer, faith, testimony and service?
- 3. Are there new initiatives that have been undertaken -- or need to be undertaken -- to remain faithful to our call as a congregation in this neighbourhood and beyond?

Part B - Are there things that we might be called to let go at this time?

AGM 2015

- 1. Who is the most generous person you know? (ie. someone who shares spontaneously with others, giving their time, encouraging relationships, contributing money joyfully to help others and support God's work, etc.)
- 2. When have you been in receipt of someone else's generosity and thoughtfulness? What was the impact on you? Did it change or

shape your life in any way? If so, how?

3. What do you most value about the community of faith that is Parkdale United Church? The Spirit's use of these questions, and others, yielded some incredible sharing, insights, and ideas for our ongoing life and ministry.

Since February of this year, Parkdale's Council of Elders, among other things, has been discussing, reflecting on and praying about our direction, life and witness. We have also been celebrating the tremendous assets, energy, gifts, commitment and ministry that are present and at work in the congregation. As well, we have been taking stock of our financial assets and our giving patterns with the view of continuing to engage the congregation in an ongoing conversation about our viability and our flourishing. At the end of May this year the Stewardship Committee convened a Stewardship Conversation workshop with guest presenter Rev. Dr. Glen Stoudt in which we reflected on these and other dimensions of stewardship.

Over this same period of time - two years plus - the United Church of Canada (UCC) has been undertaking a Comprehensive Review process to discern a new way of configuring the structure of the denomination and streamlining its governance and its ministry support and justice programs.

One of the resulting initiatives has been the development of a toolkit to encourage local congregations to have frank and faithful conversations about their identity, their mission, their work and commitment in their local community and the level of financial support to the congregation and the Mission and Service Fund (this national fund enables the UCC to carry out its mission and ministry in Canada and around the world, including disaster and relief work such as the present refugee crisis).

So as we are preparing to celebrate the 85th anniversary of Parkdale United Church (PUC) on May 1, 2016, and responding to the UCC's encouragement, PUC's Council of Elders is supporting a worship, preaching and action emphasis for the four Sundays in October 2015. The themes will be as follows:

The overarching theme is "A Season of Stewardship: our identity, our purpose, our response."

Week 1 – October 4 – "Called to Be the Church" Acts 2: 1-21

- We will be recognizing that our heritage and mandate as a congregation is part and parcel of both the historic and the present-day worldwide Church of Jesus Christ. This is meant to coincide with World Communion Sunday.

Week 2 – October 11 – "Living Thankfully Every Day... the life of faith and gratitude" Psalm 118; Matt. 6:25-34 - This coincides with our traditional Thanksgiving Service and will explore the joy and power of gratitude and thanksgiving

Week 3 – October 18 – "Living our Testimony and Our Mission Locally" Jeremiah 29:4-14; Matt. 3:13-16

- We will be reflecting on how we are blessing the local neighbourhood and city in which we minister. This is also World Food Sunday and following worship (1:00 pm) we have been invited to participate in a walk-a-thon to raise money for local initiatives that feed, support and advocate for those experiencing poverty, including our own In From the Cold ministry.

Week 4 – October 25 – "Our Personal Response – Offering our Gifts of Time, Energy and Money"

- We will be listening for the Holy Spirit's prompting as we worship God and reflect on how we live into our identity as followers of Jesus, and how each one can contribute joyfully and generously of who they are and of what they have been given the strength to earn.

By God's grace, please make a special commitment to attend and participate in all four worship services, and to put into practice what we hear, sense and are challenged to do and be.

Someone once said: "We will never change the world by going to church. We will only change the world by being the church."

May God bless and guide us as we embark on this 'season of stewardship'.

Sabbatical/Sabbath Proposal

Did you know that the word "sabbatical" is derived from the word "Sabbath". In the United Church of Canada. ministry personnel are encouraged to take a threemonth sabbatical every five years. This year, when the Presbytery Pastoral Care and Oversight committee made it's every-third-year visit, the ministry staff here were asked if any were thinking about taking a sabbatical. Since I have now been at Parkdale for more than six years, I started seriously considering it.

I presented a proposal to the Ministry and Personnel committee last spring as this must be done a year in advance. During this proposal period, Barbara Reynolds of Ottawa Presbytery also met with the M & P committee and explained the sabbatical process. She emphasised that the focus should be on rest and rejuvenation:

"Sabbatical leave is an extension of the biblical concept of a Sabbath day and a Sabbath year for renewal. It is both an act of faith that God will sustain us through a period of reflection, and an occasion for recovery and renewal of vital energies." (M & P Handbook, 2010)

I have been serving in continuous appointments at Parkdale United since July of 2009. During most of that time, I have been engaged in a personalized study program designed to meet the requirements to become a "recognized" designated lay minister. This involved the three-year program of the

Certificate in Youth Ministry through Princeton Theological Seminary. This program in itself was intensive and included a long-term research project as well as a year's mentorship. During that time I also completed individual courses in theology, UC polity, Old Testament, and in conflict theory from UTC, Queens, St. Paul's and Algonquin College as well as a twoweek Leadership module from the Centre for Christian Studies.

In this same period, in addition to working full-time at Parkdale, I have served on a Presbytery review, search, and YAYA committees and am currently the chair of the Youth and Young Adult Committee.

My work at Parkdale requires me to be continuously creative. Each week I write a children's story. I have taught in every age group of the Sunday school although I

mainly focus on the youth class. I lead youth groups, women's groups, study groups, and plan retreats. About eight times a year I lead intergenerational worship. The work is rewarding but the last six years have been intense.

Recently, I led a study group through the book, "The Artist's Way". I was reminded forcibly that a creative person draws from a well within themselves and this well needs to be replenished. During this study we were encouraged to examine those things that fill-up our particular wells and for which we do not make enough time.

"In filling the well, think magic. Think delight. Think fun. Do not think duty...In filling the well, follow your sense of the mysterious, not your sense of what you should know more about...filling the well needn't be all novelty. Cooking can fill the well...

Any regular, repetitive action primes the well." Julia Cameron

For my sabbatical, I propose a time of replenishing my creative spirit with the following activities that I have found to be most helpful to me:

- Spending time in nature --visiting some sites in Canada that I have long wanted to see.
 - -- A sabbath activity that is restful for the mind and opening to God's presence for someone who commutes on the 417 every day. Travel options will be defined by my personal finances
- Crafting -- designing and beginning a quilt

 a creative task that helps leave the mind free and open to ideas
- 3. Reading -- Materials that will enlarge my understanding of the people I work with
- 4. Walking/hiking (see #1)
- 5. Praying -- intentional

- days spent in prayer and scriptural reflection
- 7. Writing
 - --I have some personal writing projects which are constantly deprioritized because of work pressures
- 8. Additionally, I would like to compile the intergenerational worship resources I have created over the years. It is my hope to find a way to make these available to other worship leaders. This might be in the form of a website or some other means.

A copy of the whole proposal is available for anyone who is interested, but you probably will find the dates most pertinent. Sometimes ministry personnel take their vacation (one month) and study leave (three weeks) and add this to sabbatical to have a continuous period of about five months away but I propose the following time-line:

May to mid-August, 2016 (three months' sabbatical plus two weeks of vacation). I wish to return in August so that I will have time to prepare for all the start-ups in September. This will leave me two weeks' vacation time of which I hope to take 10 days at the beginning of October 2016, for a long-planned extended -family trip. There are a couple of conferences that I like to participate in that usually land around the end of April so I may take a week of study leave then. Thus, the actual start of my absence may come towards the end of April 2016.

There are several major pieces of work that normally get accomplished during that time period. Although I may be able to do some pre-planning, I can't do eight months' work in the four months leading up to my sabbatical. On the other hand I would not like to return from sabbatical to find that nothing had been

done in my absence. In addition to explaining what I propose to do on my sabbatical, I also set out some detailed recommendations for covering the work that usually is accomplished during the time period when I will be absent:

- Recruiting for and scheduling the fall teaching schedules
- Ordering the fall curriculum (which cannot be done in advance)
- Recruiting for and scheduling the summer teaching schedule
- Planning, ordering and purchasing video material for the summer program
- Organizing snacks and juice for summer Sunday school as well as colouring and activity pages
- Planning and running the family camp program
- Sending out a letter to all families letting them know of fall events and welcoming them back to Sunday school
- Planning for fall

- activities (youth groups, coffee shop, Christmas pageant)
- Creating posters, bulletin announcements, Messenger announcements, pieces for the website, etc. for all activities
- Planning and enacting two or three intergenerational worship services
- Analysing the attendance sheets, updating the data base and creating the new class lists for the fall

- Assessing the Sunday school supplies and replenishing as necessary
- Communicating with families, youth, kids, committee members, etc.
- Assisting with a couple of coffee shop opening days
- Helping to lead DaleSong (liaising with the ministerial staff about themes, helping to choose appropriate music, copying music)
- Teaching Sunday school (youth class usually)
- Writing and conveying

CONGREGATIONAL METTING

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING – SEPTEMBER 13, 2015

The meeting was called to seek approval from the congregation to proceed with the audiovisual project.

Blaine opened the meeting and briefly explained its purpose. Melodee Lovering then introduced and thanked members of the Committee that had worked on this project: Anthony Bailey, Barbara Faught,

Richard Hamley, Gary Crocker, Susan Pfister, Carolynn Halkett, Danica Rogers, and Trevor Williams

Various members of the working group outlined the process to date and presented the two quotes, one from AVISPL, for approximately \$65K and the other from Interactive Audio Visual at \$53, 756 and explained the reasons for their preference – IAV; this quote includes a third projector and has the



added value of Dave Patterson's experience with Orleans United. An important consideration is the need for a dedicated AV team to run the equipment; ideally, this team would be in place before the equipment arrives. There have been some expressions of interest but the Technology Committee is looking for more.

The detailed estimate from IAV came in at \$60, 472 and \$1800 will be required for electrical upgrades, so the total to be financed is \$62, 272. To date, \$17K has been raised: \$12K was included in the 2015 Budget and \$5K has been pledged by Council, so the amount to be found is \$45,272. (At the Council meeting of September 15, it was agreed that the \$10K gift from Emmanuel United Church should be put

towards this project, so the amount to be financed is \$35,472.)

The meeting then turned to questions from the congregation. Almost all questions or comments were preceded by a word of support.

☐ With respect to ongoing costs, maintenance costs are estimated to be approximately \$200 per year; bulbs last approximately five years; any additional software purchases would be extra.

☐ Livestreaming could be a future

possibility, but would quire cameras, which are not in the current cost estimate.

□ Using the wall as a screen would not be ideal, as the screens are designed to enhance the brightness of the projection, which will be required on a sunny day. (It was exceptionally dark and rainy during the demonstration.)

☐ The extra work to prepare the Powerpoint presentation and the learning curve associated with this were acknowledged; offers to help with preparation of weekly services have been received.

☐ Although we could start with one projector, two projectors are optimum; people on the opposite side of the sanctuary can't see the screen and two screens provide some flexibility in sunny conditions. In addition, we don't have any idea of what the future price of a second projector might be.

☐ Security was one of the issues discussed at length by the committee; the projectors are very heavy and will be locked down.

☐ Ministerial staff have been wanting this system for a time; the point is not to distract, but to enhance the worship experience. The system will be used on a regular basis, at least for some things, and its use will be undertaken sensitively.

☐ There is no intention to remove the hymnbooks from the pews; in fact hymnbook references will be included on slides. Projection of music may be a future possibility.

☐ The projection of music and liturgy leaves hands free and forces eyes upward, freeing people up to clap or move more fully, resulting in a more participatory experience.

☐ If outside groups want to use our equipment, they will have to pay our technicians; we will protect the equipment.

☐ With respect to the funding proposal, Council did consider using the Memorial Endowment Fund, but given that we already use this Fund on an annual basis to cover operating deficits, and the fact that the congregation has a history of rising to the challenge of funding specific projects, it was decided not to at this time.

☐ Production of the paper version of the bulletin, including paper, ink, toner, is about two cents per page. It was noted that the new photocopier folds and staples, so there has been a





COUNCIL MEETING — SEPTEMBER

MESSENGER REPORT OF COUNCIL MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 15, 2015

The first meeting of Council following the summer break was held on September 15, 2015. Members were welcomed back by Council Chair, Blaine Pauling, who then passed the floor to Rev. Anthony Bailey, who led the opening devotion, which was on the theme of anger. The theme had been inspired by recent events that made him angry, the Syrian refugee crisis being one of these. Council members were asked to consider three questions: What makes me angry? What do I do with it? How does it teach me? We were reminded that God gets angry and Jesus got angry; it is OK to get angry when the cause is legitimate. The challenge is then how we channel all that energy into positive action. We watched a Rob Bell video, entitled "Store", which depicted some of the small irritations in everyday life that can build to the breaking point. It is left to us to choose to spend that bottled energy and emotion in a positive fashion. Anthony closed the time of devotion with a timely and relevant prayer.

The business meeting began with an enthusiastic discussion of how to move forward on the funding of the proposed new technology for the sanctuary as approved by the

congregation during the congregational meeting on September 13, 2015. Various options were discussed, and the possibility of using the Remembrance Fund (included in the Memorial Endowment Fund) and/ or the gift of \$10K from Emmanuel United were focal points. The importance of asking the congregation to contribute was emphasized. In addition, the need to recruit members of a dedicated audiovisual team was reiterated as critical to the success of the project. After discussion, it was decided that the \$10K gift from Emmanuel United should be applied to this project, which brings the total raised to date to \$23,400; this amount also includes \$12K included in the Capital budget for 2015 and \$1400 received to date of the approximately \$6K pledged by Council members. A 'thermometer' of some sort will be posted in near future so that the congregation can see the progress towards raising the required \$65K. As agreed from the outset, no action will be taken to purchase the equipment until 50% of the funds have been identified. The goal is to have the new technology in place for use during Advent. Barbara Faught offered sincere and gracious thanks to Melodee Lovering, who was instrumental in seeing this project through and who prepared all the material for the demonstration of the new technology on September 13. Council also discussed a communications strategy for this project and emphasized the need for a

dedicated audio-visual team as well as financing for this important project. You will be hearing more about this over coming weeks so stay tuned!

This fundraising effort will run in parallel with the ongoing efforts related to sponsoring a Syrian refugee family. In this latter regard, over \$15,000 has been raised to date and we are confident that our \$30,000 target will be reached through the efforts and pledges of Parkdale members and the larger community.

Council was informed that Judy Hamley has very graciously offered to replace Ann Tompkins in her role as Bazaar coordinator. Thank you Judy! The search continues for someone who is willing to take on the role that Val Hum has played over many years, but it appears that Parkdale's Yuletide Bazaar will take place on the first Saturday in November. Council again expressed its thanks to Ann and Val for their tremendous contribution to Bazaar coordination over past years. Committee Chairs provide written reports to Council in advance of every meeting; a summary of these appears below.

On behalf of **Mission**, **Outreach and Justice**, Faye Beaufort reported that efforts continue to complete the required paperwork for sponsorship of our Syrian refugee family. A musical fund-raising event for our refugee family is planned for

November 21, with event convenors Carolynn Halkett, Faye Beaufort and John Harewood backed up by committee members Anthony Bailey and Jono Hamer-Wilson. Faye also reported that in addition to answering the call for a \$900 donation, Parkdale members have been volunteering at the Odawa Drop-In Centre, which has reopened after a strong appeal to the community and religious organizations. The Celebrating our Cultures event will take place on Saturday October 17. This year the life, customs, food and music of Australia will be profiled. Mark your calendars for this popular event! Images and Stories started its 2015-16 season with a repeat of Hannie Fitzgerald's presentation entitled "Labrador in Those Days," brought back by popular demand. In coming months, Elise Mennie will present Peru (October 30) and Barbara Hennessy will present Alaska (November 27).

Mary McLeod, Chair of **Pastoral Care** reported a good response to the request for donations to Caring Kitchens over the summer; the need is, however, ongoing and donations are always gratefully accepted. Visiting and sending of sympathy and get well cards continues and planning is underway for the Special Communion on October 18th.

Carolyn Halkett reported that the **Communications Committee** has developed a graphic image, including Parkdale's motto: Come. Grow. Serve, that can be used on stationary,

publications, posters, the website, etc. It is available upon request from Don in the office. During the fall, the Committee will work on a more appropriate logo for promotional products such as caps, pens, pins and social media. Also during the fall, redesign of the website will be a priority; a consultant from Daisy Designs has been hired to assist with this effort. Website content is also in the process of being updated and reformatted.

Judy Hamley, Chair of **Ministry and Personnel,** noted that June reviews with staff were undertaken and specific suggestions from those meetings have been conveyed to appropriate Committee chairs for action. The three Ministerial staff were authorized to attend a conference from September 21-23 in North Carolina, the theme of which is preparing for Advent; this will replace the requirement for a staff retreat. Judy also reported that the CPR and Automatic Defibrillator (AED) training for all Staff, led by the Ottawa Paramedic Service: in total, 31 people received training and feedback was extremely positive.

Our Ministerial staff also provide written reports to each Council meeting. Highlights of these follow:

Anthony reported positive feedback on the summer preaching series on the Psalms. In addition, he noted that he, Debbie and Melodee are very much looking forward to participating together in a Worship and Arts Conference in Montreat, NC. from September 21-23. With respect to Faith Formation, a two-month Tuesday morning Bible study on the epistle of James and a Wednesday evening series on "Soul-Keeping" have begun. In October, in keeping with one of the Memorial Fund Working Group recommendations and the support of the Stewardship Committee and colleagues, Anthony will be preaching exclusively on Stewardship themes. The objective is to enhance a faithful understanding of our calling as stewards in life, faith, vocation, ministry and financial generosity. Baptisms will be celebrated on October 11 and November 13. During coming months, Anthony will attend the United Church Black Clergy conference in Montreal from October 8 -10, will preach and be the keynote speaker at the Lester Randall Preaching Conference at Yorkminister Baptist Church on Toronto from November 1-3, and will participate at the Stewardship Conference in New Orleans from December 1-4. Anthony has recently given a number of interviews on the growing Syrian refugee crisis and has been invited to sit on the Mayor's advisory committee to craft a response to the crisis for the Ottawa community. A Public Forum will take place at Jean Pigott Hall on October 1, from 5:30 to 7:00pm.

Debbie reported that she and Melodee have begun planning for the Women's Retreat to be held on January 9-10; the focus this year will be on friendship and will focus on spiritual renewal and



strengthening relationships. Debbie also reported that her enquiry about the possibility of a Habitat build in Canada with an Aboriginal focus had been enthusiastically received. Information about the potential builds for 2016 should be available soon and an invitation to the congregation will be extended at that time. Debbie has been accepted into the Final Phase of the Spiritual Director's Course, which begins with a five-day residency at Five Oaks from October 25-30. She will continue to submit regular papers, attend monthly peer supervision meetings, continue monthly meetings with her own spiritual director and attend a four day silent retreat. The Blessing group that met with Debbie during winter and spring is working on a children's book on blessing that will hopefully be done by Christmas. Monthly worship services have resumed at Park Place and The Ravines. There continues to be a growing need for pastoral care, to which the full ministerial team responds; it is a privilege and a blessing to be invited into sacred moments of life.

Melodee reported that Sunday school teachers are in place for most semesters; classes began on September 20. Confirmation classes will begin on October 4 and run for six Sundays (Thanksgiving Sunday excluded) and a Saturday retreat. Junior youth will run for four weeks beginning on October 18; timing for Senior youth to be

determined. The June family camp was a tremendous success, with great weather. Sadly, this was not the case for the youth camping trip in mid-September; the leaders and youth returned Saturday night due to bad weather. Parkdale has agreed to host the Saturday evening worship


Registration is 20 dollars for adults and 10 dollars for children (18 years old and younger). We will still run the event if it rains or snows.

A memorial art piece honouring murdered and missing Aboriginal women

Walking With Our Sisters is a commemorative art installation to honour the lives of missing and murdered Indigenous Women of Canada and the United States; to acknowledge the grief and torment families of these women continue to suffer; and to raise awareness of this issue and create opportunity for broad community-based dialogue on the issue.

The art installation includes 1, 725 pairs of beaded moccasin tops, or "vamps", and 65 songs—traditional, honour, grieving and ceremonial songs—are heard as people experience the exhibit. In response

to the call for artwork, 65 beading groups were created in communities.

Walking With Our Sisters is an entirely crowd-sourced project. Collectively we are creating one unified voice to honour these women, their families and call for attention to be paid to this issue. There is power in numbers, and there is power in art.

Pamby: It's not as simple as that; yes, I get mad but I also feel embarrassed that I'm passing another human being who may be really in need.

Namby: I don't understand why you should be beating up on yourself if you think that they are nuisances and responsible for their situation. Besides, you or I can't save the world. Giving a loonie or a meal here and there won't change much.

Pamby: That's true and would be okay if it ended like that.

RECIPE

Mom Yearwood's Famous Stuffing, and the Turkey to go with it

Yearwood Seasoning

□ 2 medium onions

underneath the skin

II 2 annigga afhattata (ayann anigna)

** Makes about 2 cups - use to season a variety of meats, and to Stuffing	make Turkey
Chop the following ingredients together finely in a food processor	or:

n p shuks ananora (ki een omona)
🛮 1 cup lightly packed fresh parsley OR ¼ cup unpacked dried parsley
1 1/2 tsp each: garlic powder, poultry seasoning, and paprika
1 tsp each curry powder (mild) and black pepper
0 3 TBSP Luda Chicken soup mix
2 TBSP hot sauce (or whatever your palate can handle) **
🛮 ½ packet onion soup mix
Yearwood Turkey - be warned - this is a three-day event and starts with a FRESH Turkey!
Γwo days before you plan to serve the turkey:
□ Wash the turkey well, then place in roaster and sprinkle it with salt, vinegar, and lemon juice
One day before you plan to serve the turkey:
□ Wash off all the salt, vinegar, and lemon juice □ Rub Yearwood secret seasoning over the whole turkey, including



RECIPE

On the morning you plan to serve the turkey:
□ Preheat oven to 450°F.
☐ Prepare the stuffing.
☐ Stuff your bird (neck and tail ends) - packing the stuffing in well.
□ Place bird in oven, and reduce heat to 350°F.
□ Cook 20 min./1b for a stuffed bird.
Yearwood Stuffing (with a West-Indian flare)
** Adjust ingredients for the size of bird – this works well for a 20 lb turkey
🛘 one box / four sleeves (450 g) unsalted soda crackers (ie - Premium Plus)
□ 6 TBSP of margarine
□ 1/3 cup milk
☐ Yearwood Seasoning (almost 2 cups—whatever amount is remaining after seasoning the turkey
□ Place soda crackers in a very large bowl and crush them up with your hand:
☐ Add the seasoning and margarine, and mix up with your hands
☐ Add milk slowly, mixing as you go until texture is a bit sticky but not wet
□ Stuff bird, as noted above
